

## **<u>Call for papers:</u>** Participatory Arts and Social Action Research

## 10th and 11th November 2017

Conference Venue: Resource for London 356 Holloway Road, London, N7 6PA

This international multidisciplinary conference looks at how participatory and creative research methods create a space for exploring, sharing and documenting processes of belonging and place-making that is crucial to understanding migration, citizenship and belonging. It is our intention to bring together academics from a range of social science, humanities and arts disciplines including sociology, social policy and applied theatre, alongside policymakers, artists and practitioners (including in migration, families, arts and performance) to exchange knowledge on related fields of research and the use of participatory arts methodologies to explore broader sociological and policy issues.

While the topic of migration and migrant families is key to our own research project, we also welcome contributions on related issues of engaging marginalized groups in research, arts and social action. Proposals for papers, academic, artistic and practice based workshops and panels from academics, practitioners and policymakers including, but not limited to the following:

- reflective accounts of research projects applying participatory, collaborative and creative methods
- reflections on participatory, creative and collaborative research, engagement and dissemination
- methodological, epistemological and theoretical reflections on participatory, creative and collaborative methods, including feminist, decolonial, inclusive approaches
- opportunities and challenges of co-production across academic, arts, practice sectors

This two-day event arises from the Participatory Arts and Social Action Research (PASAR), a two-year research project looking at how participatory theatre and walking methods can be used for research, engagement and dissemination. The project, funded by the Economic and Social Research Council/ National Centre for Research Methods, was led by <a href="Umut Erel">Umut Erel</a>, (PI), Open University, <a href="Maggie O'Neill">Maggie O'Neill</a> (CI) University of Greenwich and Erene Kaptani,

Research Fellow and Theatre Practitioner, Open University. During the conference we will report on key project findings and showcase a performance from participants involved in the project's participatory workshops.
